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A New School Year Begins At Last

As July comes to an end, we would normally be finishing up with our second term and heading to a holiday. But we are still following the revised school calendar and so have just begun a new term that marks the much-delayed start of the 2021 academic year. The Form Two, Three and Four students arrived back on Friday 23rd, after a holiday of just a week.

Then the next day we welcomed our new Form One students. They come from more than thirty different primary schools in Northern, Central and Western Kenva, and are young people who have great academic potential but are from disadvantaged families. We had not been able to travel for field work in their home areas, so they were interviewed on their arrival here There was then an introductory meeting in the hall, and each Form Two student took responsibility for the 'daughter' or 'son' they had been allocated. The new students are already getting stuck into school life and we pray they will feel at home and make the most of all the opportunities that are available to them here

We continue with the COVID precautions of wearing masks, washing hands and monitoring temperatures. Until recently cases were low in Kenya but now they are increasing rapidly as the Delta variant spreads. Nine counties are particularly affected, including our county Nyandarua, and hospitals in Nairobi are feeling the strain. The government have just extended the night-time curfew, banned public gatherings, and limited church services to one third capacity. They are also focusing on trying to get more vaccines, as with only 1.2% of the population fully vaccinated, there is a very long way to go.

FORM FOUR LEAVERS

With the Form Ones now here, the school is back to capacity, unlike last term when we had only three classes in school. The Form Fours had gone home in April after taking their KCSE - a challenging three weeks in which they had to sit twenty three exams, including three science practicals. We are thankful that the exam period went smoothly, though a number of injuries on the games field made the Principal decide to ban football matches for that time!

The exam results came out after only three weeks and we are delighted that the students all did well, despite the months they had spent out of school last year. Six scored an overall grade of A-, twelve a B+, fifteen a B, two a B- and one a C+. This put Kisima at position eighteen out of the 10,567 schools in the country, and means that, for the fifth year running, all of the students will be able to proceed to university with the support of a loan. They are now waiting to hear which courses they have been selected for.

Our aim for the students is that they will not only achieve great exam results, but that they will also cultivate good character, grow spiritually and leave Kisima with the desire to bring help and change to their families and communities. Therefore we are happy to hear what they had to say at the end of their time here:

'Kisima has really moulded me into a responsible and caring person. I have interacted with students from different tribes and have learnt to live harmoniously with them.'

'The values I have acquired at Kisima will make me a successful person in future. These values include humility, generosity, prayerfulness and honesty.'

'I have learnt how to cope with challenges without despairing. My spiritual life has been moulded. I am really motivated that in future I will help another person to acquire education.'

'I will always give my best in everything I do. I now have a future because with education I can fulfill my dreams and be able to help my parents and the community.'

'I have learnt the virtues of sacrifice, being kind and always ready to help, and believing in God for everything.'

'I have additional value in my life and have changed from a naive boy to a courageous, respectful and self-driven person.'

'I have been inspired to be a great aid and support to the community.'

'I am a transformed person. I have learnt to give and to have passion for helping other people.'

- This year we did not receive the long rains that usually come from March to May. As a result, our tanks were running dry and we had to depend on piped water. Furthermore, the maize that had been planted at the school farm dried up just after germinating. We have now had some rain and the farm has been re-planted with wheat. The rain is accompanied by low temperatures which are a challenge for many of the students, especially those who come from hotter parts of the country.
- Because of the short terms under the new school calendar, the students are continuing to have extra lessons in the morning and evening. Some are struggling with the pace of learning and are not getting the results they are aiming for in class. It is especially hard work for those who have just moved to Form Four, as they have the most to catch up with and now have no long holiday before their KCSE next March.
